Offer something to drink	- Can I offer you something to drink, like tea or coffee?" - "What would you like to drink?" - "Can I get you something to drink?"
Ask if it is their first time visiting.	- "Have you been to London before?" - "Is this your first time in London?" - "How long are you staying?" - "Will you have any time to visit places in London?" - "Will you have any time to look around London?" - "Can I recommend a few places to visit?"
Start talking about business	- "Ok, shall we go to the meeting room?" - "Maybe now is a good time to start the meeting." - "Whenever you want to we can start."



Welcome	(other) - "It's a pleasure to meet you John." (you) -"The pleasure is all mine."

	(you) - "Do you go to a lot of restaurants?" (other) - "Yes especially on business trips, it's the good part of the job. At the office I don't always have time."

(you) - "And outside of work, do you go to a lot of restaurants?"
